6. School Management are
aware that the self-isolation
advice for people <u>with</u>
COVID-19 has changed from
17 th January 2022. It is now
possible to end self-isolation
after 5 full days, following 2
negative LFD tests taken 24
hours apart. The
first LFD test should not be
taken before the fifth day. If
it is negative the person can
take another LFD test on day
6, assuming this is negative
and no raised temperature,
the person can leave
isolation. The self-isolation
period remains 10 full days
for those <u>without</u> negative
results from 2 LFD tests
taken a day apart. A 'user-
friendly' chart is enclosed at
the bottom of this
Assessment;
7. School Management will
continue with:



a. Ensuring good hygiene
for everyone e.g.,
frequent and thorough
hand cleaning using soap
& water or hand
sanitiser;
b. Promote the 'catch it, bin
it, kill it' approach to
support respiratory
hygiene with bins in each
Classroom;
c. Maintain an appropriate
cleaning schedule using
standard products such
as detergents &
disinfectants. This should
include regular cleaning
of areas and equipment
(for example, twice per
day), with a particular
focus on frequently
touched surfaces;
d. Keeping occupied spaces
well ventilated – See GP
Maximising Ventilation &
CO₂ Monitors;
8. Staff and pupils with
COVID19 symptoms, or a
positive PCR test result
should self-isolate in line
with the current stay-at-
home guidance. If anyone in
our School community



develops COVID-19
symptoms, however mild,
they will be sent them home
and they should follow
public health advice. For
pupils and staff with
symptoms, they should
avoid using public transport
and, wherever possible, be
collected by a member of
their family or household;
9. If a person becomes unwell
with symptoms of
coronavirus while in our
School setting and needs
direct personal care until
they can return home. A
fluid resistant (IIR type) face
mask <u>must</u> be worn by the
supervising adult if a
distance of 2 metres cannot
be maintained. If physical
contact with the person is
necessary, then gloves, an
apron and a fluid resistant
(IIR type) face mask <u>must</u> be
worn by the supervising
adult. If a dynamic risk
assessment determines that
there is a risk of splashing to
the eyes, for example from
coughing, spitting, or
vomiting, then eye



protection (goggles or face
shield) should also be worn.
Any rooms that they have
used will be cleaned after
they have left;
10.In exceptional
circumstances, if parents or
carers cannot arrange to
have their child collected, if
age-appropriate and safe to
do so, the child should walk,
cycle or scoot home. If this is
not possible, and School
needs to take responsibility
for transporting them home,
School Management will do
one of the following:
a. Use a vehicle with a
bulkhead or partition
that separates the driver
and passenger;
b. The driver and passenger
should maintain a
distance of 2 metres
from each other;
c. The driver should
use PPE, and the
passenger should wear a
face covering if they are
old enough and able to
do so;
11.The local authority may be
able to help source a



suitable vehicle which would
provide appropriate
protection for the driver,
who should be made aware
that the individual has
tested positive or is
displaying symptoms;
12.Face coverings are no longer
advised for pupils, staff and
visitors in classrooms or
communal areas;
13.School is aware that
Government Guidance
indicates that limiting the
attendance of parents and
carers at sessions/ dropping
off & collecting has now
been removed. However, to
support our control
measures applicable for our
site/ buildings e.g., robust
cleaning regime/ maximizing
ventilation/ CEV & CV
persons etc against all
infectious diseases, we will
continue with staggered
start and finish times for the
school day;
14. When a vulnerable pupil is
self-isolating, School
Management will:
a. Notify their social worker
(if they have one) and,



for looked-after children,
the local authority virtual
school head;
b. Agree with the social
worker the best way to
maintain contact and
offer support;
15.School Management have
procedures in place to:
a. Check if a vulnerable
pupil is able to access
remote education
support;
b. Support them to access it
(as far as possible);
c. Regularly check if they
are accessing remote
education;
d. Keep in contact with
them to check their
wellbeing and refer onto
other services if
additional support is
needed.
16.School Management can
now plan to undertake
educational visits in groups
of any number and children
will no longer need to be
kept in consistent groups.
School Management will
review the viability of
