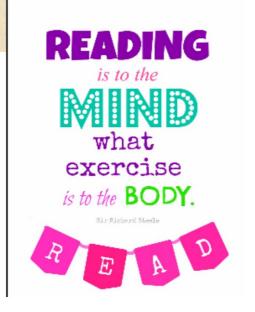
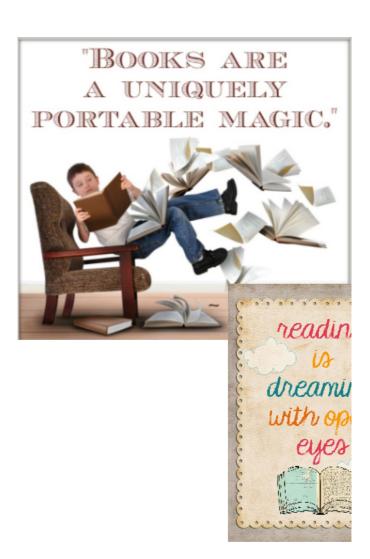

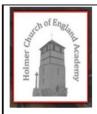

Year 4 Reading Impact

Key Aims -

- To help you to support your child when reading at home;
- To provide you with an insight into different question types;
- To promote comprehension activities.

What is reading comprehension?

Comprehension is the understanding and interpretation of what has been read. It is the ability to understand the meaning of the words in each context or situation.

To be able to accurately understand written material, children need to be able to:

- (1) decode what they read;
- (2) make connections between what they read and what they already know;
- (3) think deeply about what they have read.

Comprehension questions can come in different forms.

Retrieval

The answer is always in the text in front of you and you are just picking it out!

Examples

What colour hair does Tom have?

Where did the two characters go?

Which items did they take with them?

Where did Lisa and her Aunty go?

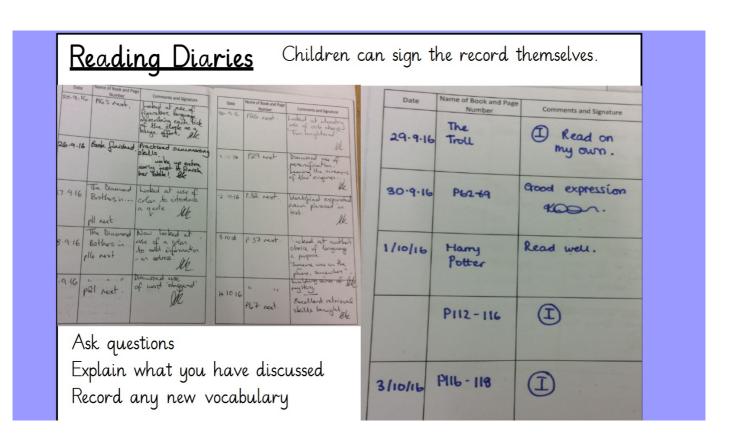
Will consist of a page length extract and 2 questions from each question type - Retrieval, Inference and Choice.

- Promote reading as a fun and enjoyable activity.



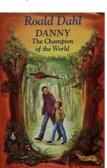
Reading Diaries

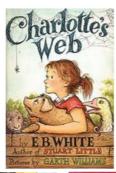
If pupils read $5 \times a$ week and their reading book is signed and recorded and it includes 2 questions or discussions with another family member they will receive two raffle tickets.

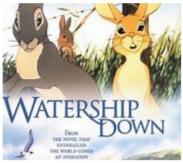








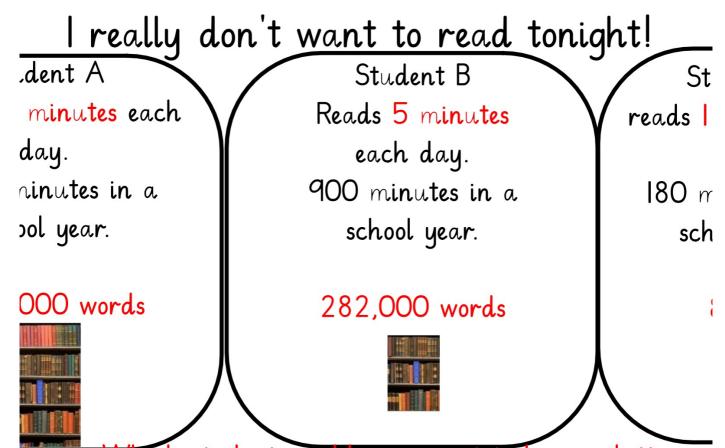




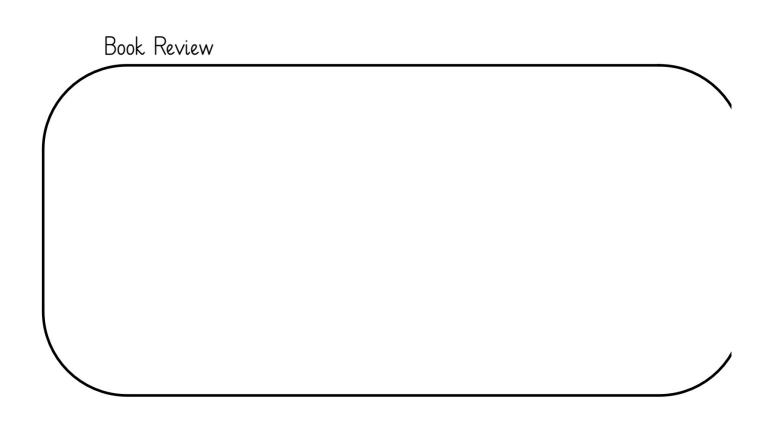
