Year 2

In Year 2, we have especially enjoyed our RE lessons this half term, where we have been exploring what Christians believe God is like. During this topic, we visited Holmer Church and Vicar Wayne shared some wonderful parables from the Bible that helped us understand how Christians see God as both loving and holy. He told us about how God shows his love through caring for people in the story of the Lost Coin.

Back in class, we have used our Voice 21 skills to discuss what we learned from different parables and shared thoughtful reflections on how these ideas help Christians feel close to God. The children offered kind and insightful thoughts about how showing love and kindness in our own lives can reflect what we learned about God. This has been a meaningful and reflective half term, and the children have really enjoyed asking big questions and sharing their ideas.













Year 1

Throughout November, we have been reading 'The Robot and the Bluebird' by David Lucas. The children have really enjoyed learning all about bluebirds and showcasing their knowledge in a fact file. Alongside this, they have explored what it might be like to be a robot which included expressive dancing. In P.E, our focus has been fitness, and the children are gaining an understanding of how our bodies work when exercising. They have practiced their balancing skills and worked together in pairs to evaluate their skills and support each other. In preparation for our upcoming Carols around the Christmas tree event, we have been busy singing our hearts out learning some new songs which we hope you will enjoy with us on Wednesday 18th December.

Year 6

During November, Year 6 pupils have been building on their prior learning of working collaboratively to produce presentations. Class 6D have chosen 'Art' as their focus, delving into a range of artistic expressions. They explored Street art, abstract art, and are also investigating how the written word and music, including rap, can serve as forms of artistic expression. This diverse range of subjects offers the pupils a unique opportunity to understand and appreciate different creative mediums, encouraging them to think critically about how art can influence and reflect society.

FASCINATING FACTS

The Royal National Lifeboat Institute (RNLI)

When the crew and passengers of boats get into difficulty at sea, they can **trust** the lifeboat crews from RNLI to try their very best to rescue them. Many of the crew and coastguards are volunteers.

- There are over 230 lifeboat stations all around the coast of Britain & Ireland
- Crews are on call 24 hours a day, every day of the year. They must be ready to drop what they are doing at a moments notice to go out on their lifeboat
