School Uniform Reminder

At Holmer, we are very proud of our school uniform and the way it helps our children feel part of our community. We ask for your support in making sure that pupils come to school dressed smartly and ready to learn.

Holmer School Uniform: Grey trousers, skirt or school pinafore; red polo shirt (with school logo or plain); green cardigan or jumper (with school logo or plain bottle green); dark socks or tights; black flat shoes; green checked dresses may be worn in summer; hair bands should be plain and in school colours (red, green, or hair coloured).

Jewellery: No jewellery should be worn, except for small round stud earrings (silver or gold only) and a watch (not a smart watch). Earrings must be removed for PE. If your child has newly pierced ears, stude should be covered with tape until they can be removed.

Hair: Hair that is shoulder-length or longer should be tied back neatly.

PE Kit

Dark green shorts; white T-shirt (with logo or plain); green hoodie (PE only - this does not replace the school jumper/cardigan); dark tracksuit bottoms (winter months); black pumps or dark/white trainers (no bright colours).

For safety: Earrings and watches must always be removed before PE lessons.



They began by stepping into the story through drama, bringing the characters to life and exploring how humour and language create such an engaging text. As part of their work, they became creative advertisers, setting up their own "wolf companies" and producing persuasive leaflets to warn rabbits of the dangers of wolves. Their visit to Hereford Cathedral during the Hereford's Military Festival gave them a valuable insight into wartime code-breaking at Bletchley Park, helping to bring history to life. In addition, pupils took part in innovative workshops with NMITE, where they enjoyed using VR technology and Spheros to explore programming.
