Computing and All Things Digital @ Holmer

Holmer has made a 'banging' start to the year! To begin the New Year, we have met with our link school, Hira Foundation School in Karachi, Pakistan. The focus of our interactions has been Global Goal 15 - Life on Land. This huge remit is about sustaining, supporting, protecting and developing Life on Land - which also includes us as humans. One pupil, who is a Digital Leader, stated that 'we have had a wonderful time talking to Pakistan'. The dedication these pupils and families has shone is inspiring! Arriving at school for 8am due to the difference in time, pupils become 'surrogate parents and wayward uncles' (self labelled) not only delivering breakfast (toast and jam) to these hardcore individuals but also taking part in discussions around Christmas, courage - what it is and how we show it as well as question and answer session around general, everyday life.

What does Conductive Education offer a child?

Conductive education (CE) is a holistic integrated pedagogical/educational system, which enables children to overcome the challenges they may face. Possible challenges:-

Increased tone in limbs (and trunk)

Hypermobility in upper limbs

Co-ordination, control and fluency of movements

Linking gross and fine movements

Strength and stamina

Hand/feet- eye co-ordination

Social and communication skills

Poor perception, proprioception, spatial awareness, attention span

Lack of self-esteem/confidence

Needs support in daily living activities (toileting, dressing/undressing, eating/drinking)

Cost of Sessions:-

Free initial consultation

First three sessions free of charge

I hour session is £22 per session

1.5 hour session is £26 per session

2 hour sessions is £35 per session


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READ TOGETHER... Moses and the Burning Bush
