Introducing Our Worship Committee



Year 4

Year 4 have had a fun filled and busy month where the children enjoyed an exciting trip to the Cathedral. At the Cathedral, the children were joined by other local schools and took part in multiple different prayer workshops where the children learned that prayer can be completed in many ways and even created their own prayers at the end of the day. The children have also completed lots of exciting learning such as carving rangoli patterns and writing their own newspaper reports in literacy.











Year 5

Year 5 had an exciting DT Day where they took on the challenge of designing thermometers for animals! The task required them to consider the specific needs of their chosen animal, factoring in their normal body temperature, the climate they live in, and how to make the thermometer both durable and eco-friendly. The children got hands-on by programming their thermometers using Microbits, ensuring they would work accurately, and then used LEGO to design sturdy, creative cases. The excitement in the room was electric as students experimented with their designs, making sure their thermometers would protect the environment and the animals they were built for. It was a fun and imaginative day, packed with innovation and teamwork—Year 5's designs truly showed their creativity and care for the planet! We can't wait to see these ideas evolve further.













Year 6

October has been a thrilling month for our Year 6 students as they continue exploring the topic of World War II. Firstly, everyone embraced the spirit of the era during our special dress-up day, which was filled with excitement! Students participated in engaging workshops that brought history to life. They learned about the rescue from the beaches at Dunkirk, experienced the tension of air raids, and discovered the resilience of life on the home front.

Moreover, on our Design Technology day, the children joyfully planned, created, and feasted upon a delicious WW2-inspired three-course meal. The menu included hearty potato soup, classic corned beef hash, and scrumptious apple crumble!

In science, the investigations continued as the children delved into the fascinating world of invertebrates. Using clay, they crafted detailed models, showcasing their newfound knowledge. What a month of learning and creativity it has been!

As a family you may want to talk about:


- why it is important to have rules and laws
