The governors who are also directors of the academy trust for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the academy trust for the year ended 31 August 2025. The governors have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) and the Academies Accounts Direction issued by the Education and Skills Funding Agency.

Holmer Church of England Academy is situated approximately one mile from the city centre of Hereford on the A49 (Hereford to Shrewsbury Road). It was founded in 1857 and moved to its present location in 1874. The school has a PAN of 420 with two classes in each year group. Within the immediate vicinity of the school is a retail shopping park, leisure centre and to the rear of the school Hereford Racecourse. The school has undergone expansion and development over the years and is a combination of Victorian and modern buildings. The catchment area of the school includes some new housing estates as well as long established dwellings.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Matthew 5:13-15 "You are the salt of the earth.....you are the light of the world."

Generosity of Spirit

Luke 10 vs 34:35 "He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him', he said".

This is shown through the parable of the Good Samaritan. It is at great cost to the Samaritan stopping in a dangerous place to help where he could have been set upon. His compassion and love extend to someone who is seen as his enemy. His generosity continued in the way he paid the Inn for the Samaritan to stay and recover.

Generosity of spirit is also shown in the way we treat other people. Generosity is about a willingness to give or to share to others. Through learning from the parable of The Sheep and the Goats, we learn about the importance of actively responding to help those in need, regardless of circumstances. By showing service to others, we are showing that we truly belong to Jesus; we will show love for others as Jesus shows love for us. The parable reminds us that we can show our love for God by loving one another.

Service to others is also shown through the way we act and behave. We treat people fairly, showing justice and have the courage to make the right decisions even when this is difficult. In offering service, we show friendship to everyone within our school, our community and in the wider world. Through our trust in God, we believe in ourselves and each other in our thoughts, words and actions.

Achievements and performance

Charitable activities

The Academy is in its fourteenth year of performance and has increased in size and is now operating near capacity. It continues to be popular being oversubscribed for September 2025 with 12 pupils on the initial waiting list.

In November 2024 the ungraded OFSTED inspection praised Holmer CofE Academy for maintaining its outstanding standards despite significant challenges, including the pandemic and flooding disruption. Inspectors described the school as "inspirational," highlighting the high-quality education delivered through a well-sequenced curriculum, a strong emphasis on reading, and excellent support for pupils with SEND. Staff were commended for their subject expertise and enthusiasm, while pupils were recognised for their exemplary behaviour, love of learning, and strong sense of community. The report also celebrated the school's commitment to personal development through a rich array of extra-curricular activities, leadership opportunities, and strong cultural awareness initiatives, supported by robust safeguarding and effective governance.

In December 2024 the SIAMS inspection praised Holmer Church of England Academy for fully living out its Christian vision of "Inspiring us all to create a better world," which continues to positively shape all aspects of school life. The report highlighted the school's strong sense of community, inclusive ethos, and the deep care shown for pupils and families, especially those with SEND. Collective worship was described as joyful and transformational, offering space for spiritual growth and reflection. Pupils benefit from a broad and inspiring RE curriculum and are empowered to engage in courageous social action through eco and social justice initiatives. The report commended leadership and governance for their compassionate and strategic approach, ensuring the wellbeing and flourishing of all pupils and staff. Holmer was found to be a place where all are encouraged to shine and where lives are transformed through faith, nurture, and action.

In 2025 the academic achievements of pupils across the academy was once again above National.

Financial review

Financial position

The majority of the Academy's income is obtained from the DfE in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE during the year ended 31 August 2025 and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the statement of financial activities.

The Academy also receives grants for capital expenditure from the DfE in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (FRS 102) and the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2019), such grants are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the fixed asset fund. The restricted fixed asset fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the useful life of the assets concerned as defined in the Academy's accounting policies.

During the year ended 31 August 2025, total expenditure of £1,892,682 (2024 : £1,906,039) was covered by recurrent grant funding from the DfE together with other incoming resources. The total net incoming resources before transfers and revaluations for the year was £46,008 deficit (2024: £49,939 surplus).

At 31 August 2025, the net book value of fixed assets was £3,181,494, (2024: £3,207,827) and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in the notes to the financial statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the Academy.

At 31 August 2025, the in-year surplus was £17,008 deficit (2024: £59,939 surplus) after actuarial gains/losses on defined benefit schemes.

Financial review

Investment policy and objectives

Any excess monies, being those monies over three months of wages costs, are put on short-term deposits to obtain the best returns possible.

Reserves policy

The governors review the reserve levels of the Academy annually. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The Academy's current level of reserves (total funds less the amount held in fixed assets and restricted funds) is £300,730 (2024: £277,834), all of which is free reserves. The level of general restricted reserves is £115,735 (2024: £129,307).

The academy sets a policy of reserve of holding three months salary bill, equating to £390,000. The reserve in excess of this currently being held are to enable the Academy to maintain increased teacher pupil ratio, with children in upper Key Stage 2 being taught in three classes for core teaching of mathematics and Literacy and to provide additional tutoring and bespoke interventions. The reserves will enable this additional support to continue over the coming years.

A surplus or deficit position of the pension scheme generally results in a cash flow effect for the academy trust in the form of an increase or decrease in employers' pension contributions over a period of years. Please see the notes to the financial statements for further details of the current position.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Governing Body has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

Fundraising

The academy trust does not use any external fundraising. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Governors consider that the principal risks and uncertainties facing the Academy are:

- Ensuring students meet educational standards in key subjects
- Adhering to statutory obligations including employment legislation, data protection, anti-discrimination laws, Companies House and HMRC regulations, child protection guidelines, Charity Commission rules, and National Curriculum requirements.
- Financial risk management - avoiding budget deficits, responding to changes in funding, implementing robust financial controls and systems, preventing fraudulent activities, and ensuring financial commitments are authorised appropriately.
- Mitigating operational risks by hiring experienced and suitable staff and maintaining accurate, current and relevant information.
- Estates management (see below)

The key controls used by the Academy include:

- Detailed terms of reference for all committees
- Formal agendas for the Academy board and committees
- Schemes of delegation and formal financial regulations
- Formal written policies
- Clear authorisation and approval levels
- Policies and procedures required by law to protect the vulnerable

Estate management and security

Maintaining the current buildings are a mixture of Victorian and Modern buildings. Comprehensive work following flooding in 2020 and extensions in 2023 have resulted in vast areas of the school being refurbished including painting and flooring.

Maintaining the roofing of the building and protecting the lead and maintaining flat roofs. This has been mitigated in part through the installation of CCTV to deter theft.

The Academy has continued to maintain and expand buildings with a second floor of the Williams building completed at the end of 2023 academic year and a Music room being built in 2024. During 2025 additional security work has taken place with additional perimeter fencing being installed and camera entrance.

The security of the building is maintained with high tech CCTV, perimeter fence and fob entrance.

Financial and risk management objectives and policies

The School has agreed a Risk Management strategy, a Risk register and a Risk Management plan. These have been discussed by governors and include the financial risks to the school. The register and plan are constantly reviewed in light of any new information and formally reviewed annually. The finance Committee members scrutinise the academy accounts and financial reports monthly. The committee reports back to the Full Governing Body three times a year.

Risk Mitigation - Flooding

In the past four years alone, the school has experienced three flooding incidents, with two additional occurrences in the previous decade. Most recently, the school flooded twice within a span of just four weeks. As we were in the midst of drying out and preparing the building for reoccupation after the latest flood, a subsequent event occurred, causing significant setbacks.

Over the past decade, the Academy has taken extensive measures to mitigate the risk of flooding. A flood wall was constructed, a comprehensive flood risk report was commissioned, and flood barriers were acquired. However, despite these efforts, none of these precautions have been successful in preventing water from entering the building during the most recent floods.

An application for Property Flood Resilience (PFR) funding will be submitted to the Government's Risk Mitigation Service under the Risk Protection Arrangement (RPA). This has been accepted and the academy is currently completing a series of work to work to mitigate flooding including a wall around the EYFS, connecting soak away drains to mains drains, installing further flood gates and sealing drains.

Future plans

The Academy will continue to maintain and where possible improve the performance of its pupils at all levels and will continue to ensure that pupils have the best start to their education.

Admit a full cohort of 60 children each year and operate near capacity of 420 pupils.

Full details of our plans for the immediate development of the school are in the School Improvement Plan.

The Academy is currently a SAT (Single Academy Trust) and is actively exploring joining a MAT (Multi-Academy Trust).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Academy Trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The Company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust.

The Company was incorporated on the 17 November 2011 and converted from a Local Authority School to an Academy Trust on the 1st December 2011.

The governors act as the trustees for the charitable activities of Holmer Church of England Academy and are also the directors of the Charitable Company for the purposes of company law. The Charitable Company is known as Holmer Church of England Academy.

Details of the governors who served throughout the year except as noted are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on pages 1 and 2.

Members' liability

Each member of the Charitable Company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Charitable Company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Governors' Indemnities

Governors benefit from indemnity insurance purchased at the Academy Trust's expense to cover the liability of the governors which by virtue of any rule of law would otherwise attach to them in respect of any negligence, default or breach of trust or breach of duty of which they may be guilty in relation to the Academy Trust, provided that any such insurance shall not extend to any claim arising from any act or omission which the governors knew to be a breach of trust or breach of duty or which was committed by the governors in reckless disregard to whether it was a breach of trust or breach of duty or not and provided also that any such insurance shall not extend to the costs of any unsuccessful defence to a criminal prosecution brought against the governors in their capacity as directors of the Academy Trust.

The liability insurance was provided by RPA and provides cover up to £10,000,000 (2024: £10,000,000) on any one claim up until the year end.

Principal activities

This is defined in the Articles of Association.

Method of Recruitment and Appointment or Election of Governors

This is defined in the Articles of Association.

The Members may appoint by ordinary resolution a minimum of three directors.

The number of Directors shall be no less than five and shall not be subject to any maximum.

A minimum of two parent directors should be appointed.

The company may also have any co-opted Governors.

The Diocesan Corporate member shall appoint at least two Directors (at absolute discretion may appoint more than two) as long as the total number does not exceed 25%.

The total number of employees including the principal if appointed shall not exceed one third of the directors.

The Principal shall be treated for all purposes as being an ex officio governor.

Organisational structure

The Academy has a leadership structure which consists of the governors and the Senior Leadership Team. The aim of the leadership structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels. The Headteacher is the Accounting Officer.

The governors are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, approving the statutory accounts, monitoring the Academy by the use of budgets and other data, and making major decisions about the direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and staff appointments.

The Senior Management Team is the Headteacher, deputy Headteacher, assistant head teacher and four teaching staff. These leaders direct the Academy at an executive level implementing the policies laid down by the governors and reporting back to them.

Policies and Procedures Adopted for the Induction and Training of Governors

The Academy has a Governor Recruitment and Induction policy.

The training and induction provided for new governors includes a tour of the Academy and a chance to meet staff and pupils. The Governor Support Team at the Local Authority provides external training including financial matters. They provide regular updates on practice, legislation and guidance. All governors are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as governors. Conflict of interest are discussed at each meeting. At the beginning of the academic year all trustees and senior leaders reference any declarations of interest and this is filed and published on the academy website.

Arrangements of Setting Pay and Remuneration of Key Management Personnel

The Academy follows the Teachers Performance Related Pay Policy adopted by the Academy in which sets out the agreed criteria and parameters for Headteachers pay at the Academy and the Deputy Head and Senior Leaders. The policy follows the agreed policy adopted by Herefordshire Local Authority. All teaching staff are paid within the teacher's pay scales as agreed in the policy. Performance related pay targets are set each year and Teachers Pay progression is determined by the trustees annually to ensure fairness and adherence to the policy.

Related Parties and Other Connected Charities and Organisations

There were no related parties during the year. Details of Trustees Remuneration and Expenses can be seen in the notes to the financial statements.

Risk management

The governors have assessed the major risks to which the Academy is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific teaching, provision of facilities and other operational areas, and its finances. The governors have implemented a system of assess risks that the school faces, especially in the operational areas (e.g. in relation to teaching, health and safety and school trips) and in relation to the control of finance. They have introduced systems, including operational procedures (e.g. vetting of new staff and visitors, supervision of school grounds) and internal financial controls in order to minimise risk. Where significant financial risk still remains they have ensured they have adequate insurance cover. The Academy has an effective system of internal financial controls and this is explained in more detail in the Statement of Internal Control.

STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the governors are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the academy trust's auditors are unaware, and each governor has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a governor in order to make them aware of any audit information and to establish that the academy trust's auditors are aware of that information.

SCOPE OF RESPONSIBILITY

GOVERNANCE

Board of Trustees

The Articles of Association have been updated and were implemented in April 2022. The articles are based on the minority church academy articles and the Academy has four members and currently has seven trustees.

Jane Tate has acted in the incumbent's position prior to Rev Wayne Davies being appointed in September 2024.

The board has conducted an internal audit of skills and had received training and challenge from the schools School Improvement Partner, a registered OFSTED inspector. The challenges for the board this year have been to maintain the high performance of teaching and learning within the academy and to improve the building capacity with a £150,000 building project funded mainly through s106 monies.

The board scrutinise both internal data produced by the school and scrutinise external data including the IDSR. Internal data shared with Governors has been on track to the end of Key Stage performance in statutory assessments indicating it is accurate and valid data. Financial running of the school is benchmarked using data on the VMFI database.

Conflict of Interest

To ensure there are no conflicts of interest, all Governors and senior leaders complete a register of interest document at the beginning of the year. This is used as an ongoing document and checked against when any new companies or businesses are commissioned. The academy does not have ownership or control of any subsidiaries, joint ventures or associates.

The Finance Audit and General Purposes Committee is a sub-committee of the main Governing Body. Its purpose is to have financial strategic oversight of the school ensuring the best outcome for pupils in the most cost effective way whilst ensuring its building and premises are maintained to a standard to support efficient education of pupils.

REVIEW OF VALUE FOR MONEY

As accounting officer, the Principal has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to educational and wider societal outcomes, as well as estates safety and management, achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of governors where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data or by using a framework where appropriate. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

As accounting officer the principal has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

Throughout the academic year, the accounting officer assesses how resources have been used to achieve value for money and reports findings to the board of trustees. This includes the use of benchmarking data where relevant. The academy has implemented several strategies to improve value for money, including:

- **Financial Stewardship and Income Generation:** The academy has maximised its revenue budget and secured additional financial support from charities and trusts. Further income has been generated through lettings ensuring a diverse funding stream. The school is supported by a proactive and thriving PTFA who make financial donations to the Academy.

- **Improved Educational Outcomes:** Educational standards have been maintained under the oversight of subject leads and curriculum managers. Key investments have been made in staffing, including hiring specialist teachers in computing and PE, and deploying additional support through teaching assistants and one-to-one tuition. These efforts have resulted in excellent outcomes, particularly in narrowing the attainment gap for Free School Meals (FSM) students, effectively utilising Pupil Premium funds.

- **Curriculum Enhancement:** A balanced and comprehensive curriculum ensures that all students have opportunities to achieve their full potential. New initiatives include the Voice 21 Oracy project and participation in the Maths Hub for early years and KS1, supporting vocabulary development and mathematical mastery.

- **Site and Estate Management:** The academy has strategically managed its estate, adding a purpose-built music room, and has also refurbished and created a dedicated staff room and wellbeing area. Tenders were secured with careful consideration of value for money, with projects discussed at various stages with governors. Maintenance and safety issues are regularly addressed through collaboration with the Education Property Partnership.

- **Staffing and Resource Efficiency:** The staffing structure is regularly reviewed to ensure that resources are efficiently deployed, with specialists employed in key areas to meet student needs. Additionally, the academy is committed to improving financial governance, including robust financial oversight from the Finance and Audit Committee.

Financial Governance and Oversight

Governance and oversight at the academy are strong, with qualified members of the Governors Finance and Audit Sub-committee meeting three times annually to scrutinise financial records. Monthly updates are shared with governors, ensuring continuous monitoring and reporting. Key practices include:

- Annual review of all contracts to ensure they deliver best value.
- The use of the Buying Consortium to secure cost-effective purchases.
- Rigorous adherence to the school's Tendering Policy, requiring three quotes for major projects.
- Cash flow forecasts to identify and invest surplus cash balances.

The Finance Administrator and Headteacher have been instrumental in reducing costs through improved procurement and negotiation strategies.

New Initiatives for the Coming Academic Year:

- Continue expanding the Voice 21 project to enhance students' communication and listening skills.
- Further develop mathematics mastery through engagement with the Maths Hub for early years.

- Work on the school buildings to mitigate the risk of flooding
- Progress the school's application to join a Multi-Academy Trust (MAT).

THE PURPOSE OF THE SYSTEM OF INTERNAL CONTROL

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Holmer Church Of England Academy for the period 1 September 2024 to 31 August 2025 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

CAPACITY TO HANDLE RISK

The board of governors has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of governors is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2024 to 31 August 2025 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of governors.

THE RISK AND CONTROL FRAMEWORK

The Academy Trust's system of internal control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Governing Body;
- regular reviews by the Finance and General Purposes Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- identification and management of risks.

The board of governors have appointed an internal auditor, Ms N Emmett, to carry out a programme of internal scrutiny checks.

The internal reviewers role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of check on the Academy Trust's financial systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- Update on previous year's Financial Scrutiny Report:

On an annual basis, the reviewer reports to the board of trustees, through the resource committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities and annually prepares an annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

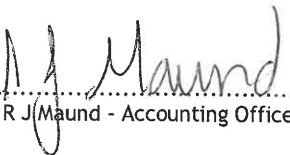

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the academy trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', the Academies Accounts Direction 2024 to 2025 issued by the DfE, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Holmer Church Of England Academy meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Going concern

The governors assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The governors make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The governors have considered the effects of the current economic inflationary pressures on their financial future and are confident there will be no significant effect on them continuing as a going concern.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at the year end. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the academy trust has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Grants

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the academy trust which amounts to a donation is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which it is receivable (where there are no performance-related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Other income

Other income including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

Donated goods, facilities and services

Goods donated for resale are included at fair value, being the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale. If it is practical to assess the fair value at receipt, it is recognised in stock and 'Income from other trading activities'. Upon sale, the value of the stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds are recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'. Where it is impractical to fair value the items due to the volume of low value items they are not recognised in the financial statements until they are sold. This income is recognised within 'Income from other trading activities'.

Donated fixed assets

Where the donated good is a fixed asset it is measured at fair value, unless it is impractical to measure this reliably, in which case the cost of the item to the donor should be used. The gain is recognised as income from donations and a corresponding amount is included in the appropriate fixed asset category and depreciated over the useful economic life in accordance with the academy trust's accounting policies.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity.

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are incurred on the academy trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its estimated useful life.

Land & Buildings	- 2% on cost
Fixtures and fittings	- 20% on cost

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Computer equipment - 33.33% on cost

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on such assets is charged to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities so as to reduce the fund over the useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the academy trust's depreciation policy. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation of these assets is not charged until they are brought into use.

Included within long leasehold is land and buildings that the school occupies under a Church Supplement Agreement with the Hereford Diocese Board of Education which gives the academy permission to occupy the site only. The Diocese Board of Education can give the academy a two year notice period to terminate the agreement and to be vacated from the site.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in the notes. Prepayments are not financial instruments. Amounts due to the charity's wholly owned subsidiary are held at face value less any impairment.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in the notes to the accounts. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, Chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy Trust at the discretion of the Governors.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the Education funding Agency where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency.

Pensions benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme, and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high-quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income/(expenditure) are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the academy trust has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

Leased Assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

- General Annual Grant (GAG): Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State, the Academy was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August
- Other DfE/ESFA Grants: are utilised for the purposes intended by the donor.
- Other Restricted Funds: include payments made towards Academy trips.
- The Pension Fund: is the surplus/(deficit) in the Local Government Pension Scheme.
- Restricted Fixed Asset Funds: include the fixed assets transferred on conversion to Academy, capital grants, additions and depreciation.
- Unrestricted Funds: are all those income and expenses for general use in the Academy.

Transfers between funds relate to re-allocation of the cash spent on fixed assets during the year.

18. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS

The academy trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Worcestershire County Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2020 and of the LGPS to the period ended 31 March 2022.

Contributions amounting to £36,263 were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2025 (2024 - £25,660) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to ensure scheme costs are recognised and managed appropriately and the review specifies the level of future contributions.

Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 27 October 2023, with the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, applying a notional investment return based on 1.7% above the rate of CPI. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- Employer contribution rates set at 28.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy). This is an increase of 5% in employer contributions and the cost control result is such that no change in member benefits is needed.
- Total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £262,000 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222,200 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £39,800 million.

The result of this valuation was implemented on 1 April 2024. The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2027.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £255,085 (2024 - £221,628).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The academy trust is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the plan. Accordingly, the academy trust has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The academy trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

18. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS - continued

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2025 was £106,796 (2024: £108,046), of which employer's contributions totalled £82,690 (2024: £83,830) and employees' contributions totalled £24,106 (2024: £24,216). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 10.8% for employers and between 5.5% and 12.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013 and on 21 July 2022, the Department for Education reaffirmed its commitment to the guarantee, with a parliamentary minute published on GOV.UK.

As the scheme has historically been in deficit, the academy entered into an agreement to make additional contributions in addition to normal funding levels. The rates payable over a three year period will be the Future Service Rate of 19.3% of payroll plus phased lump sum deficit contributions starting at £12,000 for the year 2023/24 increasing by approximately 5% per annum.

The current estimated recovery period is 14 years.

LGPS Pension - in surplus

The pension valuation as at 31 August 2025 showed a surplus of £398,000 (2024: £46,000 surplus). Having considered guidance available and acknowledging that the trust would not be entitled to a refund of this amount, the surplus has not been recognised. Therefore the closing valuation has been recognised as nil. However, the deficit payments mentioned above are still appropriate until the next formal review.
